Suffolk Regiment. Formed at Bury St. Edmunds on 7th July 1915 as a Bantam Battalion. The Commonwealth War Graves Commission has 416 recorded WW1 deaths for the 12th (Service) Battalion, (East Anglian), Suffolk Regiment.

**12th Battalion, Suffolk Regiment. - Remembering The Dead ...**

In 1782 all British Regiments without Royal titles were awarded county titles in order to aid recruitment from that region therefore after nearly 100 years of association with the county the Regiment was again re-titled as the 12th (the East Suffolk) Regiment of Foot. The 12th went on to serve in various foreign campaigns, in 1796 it set sail for India and fought in The Fourth Anglo-Mysore War (1798-1799) at the battle of Seringapatam (1799) and remained in India until 1809.

**Suffolk Regiment - Regiment History, War & Military ...**

12th (Service) Battalion (East Anglian) Formed at Bury St. Edmunds on 7 July 1915, as a bantam battalion. While still at the depot it was joined by a draft of some 200 men from the depot of the Middlesex Regiment. 25 November 1915 : moved to Bordon Camp and placed under command of 121st Brigade in 40th Division.

The origins of the Suffolk Regiment can be traced to 1685 when Henry, 7th Duke of Norfolk, raised a regiment in Norfolk and Suffolk as part of the forces of James II to meet the threat of the Monmouth Rebellion. ... 1752 became the 12th (the East Suffolk) Regiment of Foot 1758 2nd Battalion redesignated as 65th (2nd Yorkshire, North Riding) Regiment of Foot 1881 became The Suffolk Regiment 1959 amalgamated with the 1st Battalion The Royal Norfolk Regiment and became 1st Battalion, 1st East Anglian Regiment (Royal Norfolk and Suffolk)

The Suffolk Regiment was born on 1st July 1881; formed out of the old 12th (East Suffolk) Regiment of Foot. This post will look at army service numbers issued between 1881 and August 1914. Service records for all of the numbers listed below, survive in WO 363 (Burnt Documents) and WO 364 (Pensions) in the National Archives.

**Army Service Numbers 1881-1918: Suffolk Regiment - 1st ...**

The tradition varies by Regiment, but in the 12th Foot (Suffolk Regt), red and yellow roses are placed in the headgear of all ranks to mark the occasion (this also occurred 1st Aug 1944 in a rest camp in Normandy).

The Suffolk Regiment was raised in 1685 by the Duke of Norfolk to suppress the threatened Monmouth Rebellion. It was numbered 12th in 1751, to which East Suffolk was added in 1782. The 12th was one of the six British Infantry Regiments at Minden in 1759.

### The Suffolk Regiment

In 1751, when regiments were given numbers to mark their seniority, it was designated the 12th Regiment of Foot. It became the 12th, or East Suffolk Regiment in 1781 and the Suffolk Regiment in 1881. Except for two brief periods the regiment had one battalion until 1842, when a Reserve Battalion was created, which became the 2nd Battalion in 1858.

**The Suffolk Regiment Archive**

"Stabilis" meaning steady, was the personal motto of Colonel Scipio Duroure, who commanded the 12th Regiment at the Battle of Dettingen. So proud were the Regiment to bear this most appropriate of accolades, that serval times in their existence, they formally requested that they be allowed to bear it upon their Colours.

**The Suffolk Regiment - The Friends Of The Suffolk Regiment**

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The regiment was ranked in 1747 as the 12th Foot regimentand renamed as the 12th Regiment of Footin 1751. In 1758 the 2nd Battalion of the regiment was separated from it and formed the basis of the 65th (2nd Yorkshire, North Riding) Regiment of Foot.
